The Cold War Air Museum is a non-profit educational institution whose mission is to exhibit, educate and eternalize the role that Cold War aircraft, pilots and other personnel had during this conflict.

In addition to flying aircraft, related artifacts, artwork and library resources are used to perpetuate the history of this period.

A portion of the 45,000 sq. ft. museum is a working restoration facility which is actively returning many Cold War era aircraft to flying status.

The Commemorative Air Force is an educational organization dedicated to the preservation of the great combat aircraft of World War II and a portion of our military aviation heritage. Many of the CAF aircraft are rare.

The CAF operates the only flying examples of the historic B-29 Superfortress, Curtiss SB2C Helldiver and other great aircraft.

Each year more Americans see, touch the metal, smell the smoke and listen to the roar of piston-engine aircraft that are operated by the CAF than visit the static displays of all other aviation museums in the United States.

Today:

The old interurban building is home to the Visitors Center and Texas State Auxiliary Museum. It is open to the public Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

A Little Bit of History:

The Visitors Center, formerly known as the Interurban building, has welcomed visitors and businesses to our City for over one hundred years. Built in 1911, the Interurban Building was home to the Texas Interurban Railway that ran from Waxahachie through Red Oak, Lancaster, and Dallas to Sherman-Denison until the 1950s.



James Douglas Hall was the first African American Assistant Superintendent of Education in the Lancaster Independent School District (LISD) in 1997.

Hall was the principal of Rocky Crest, which is now known as J.D. Hall. Rocky Crest not only served as a school, but also as a meeting place for citizens of the African American community for special events. As the years went by, Lancaster Independent School District named J.D. Hall after its late contributor. Citizens of Lancaster voted to save this building, built in 1878, and make it an active part of the city's history.

A renovation for the campus facilities was approved with a \$1.5 million grant for the project. A museum for Rocky Crest history was created as part of the renovation. Some items from the school's past are displayed in the museum, with more being cataloged and added regularly. Students from the past have also contributed by telling their stories.
